1	ALDRICH, the Rev. W. A.	In 1867, he was the first young Deacon after the Civil War to be assigned to reactivate the Episcopal churches from Centreville to Haymarket. His entries are the first in <i>St. Timothy's Record Book I - Register of Truro Parish</i> . He always signed his name and was referred to as "W. A."
	AVERIL, Elsie DuShane	Believed to be the first person baptized from the Castleman font. Her father, George died when she was a baby and she died at age 19 of tuberculosis.
	BABCOCK, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Earle (Amelia Clarkson)	Mr. Babcock served on the Vestry. The sterling chalice, ciborium and paten were given in his memory. She was an active member of the Altar Guild, The Fellowship Club and the Episcopal Ladies' Auxiliary. She was particularly skillful in sewing church linens.
3	BALLOU, Hannah (Mrs. Lyman)	One of St. Timothy's first three Sunday School teachers. A dedicated Gleaner and charter member of The Fortnightly Club. The Ballou home still stands on the SE corner of Station St. and Park Ave. She died of "heart collapse" 22 February 1923 at age 86. <i>St. Timothy's Register II</i>
5	BALLOU, Lyman David	Church Warden, Vestryman and Trustee. 1870 Census, Herndon Dist. p. 12. Mr. Ballou, 46, is listed as a farmer with real estate valued at \$9000.00 and personal property at \$2200.00. His wife, Hannah, 32, and others are listed in his household. He was elected to the Town Council July 5, 1879. According to <i>Register #3</i> , Mr. Ballou had "Baptist leanings". He became serious about his religion when he was near death. He was baptized March 23, 1890, confirmed into the Episcopal faith March 24, 1890 and died April 2, 1890 of "paralysis" at age 65. A prosperous farmer within the boundaries of the town. The Ballou Subdivision was built on part of his acreage.
	BARKER, Mr. and Mrs. John (Katherine)	Mr. Barker moved to Herndon from New York in 1873, He died 21 Oct 1898, age 78. Katherine was active in the Fortnightly Club and was Recording Secretary of the Gleaners' Society 1891.
	BATEMAN, Violet (formerly Mrs. Carlos Carmona)	Dedicated church member since moving to Herndon in 1961. Former choir member. Vi has served on many committees to further the good of both the church and community. She was particularly active in pressuring the town for the Herndon Community Center and the Harbor House projects. Her grandfather was the first Anglican bishop of Jerusalem.
	BELL, Rev Lloyd W.	Formerly of the Dutch Reformed Church he became Minister-in-Charge of St. Timothy's while completing his studies at The Virginia Theological Seminary. He continued on after his ordination to the Deaconate on October 18, 1946.
	BETOUR, Gwen (Mrs. Gregory)	Sunday School Superintendent during the 1960s. Instrumental in the founding of The Closet, the Herndon thrift shop that collects continues to thrive.
5	BREADY Isaiah	The first acting mayor of Herndon. Isaiah and Catherine Bready farmed 110.65 acres of land within Herndon in 1872, now the site of the Community Center and Municipal Golf Course. Their stone home on Vine Street at Main was named "Elwardstone". Bready descendants continue to live there.
	BROWN, Alda (Mrs. Robert L.)	She organized and taught interested ladies in the parish to embroider the gold thread and silk work on the white and green altar hangings done in the 1960s. She designed and stitched the small blue St. Timothy's banner in 1965.
	BUELL, Mabel (Mrs. Arthur)	An outstanding member of St. Timothy's Church. She was the president of the Fortnightly Club for 25 years and the first trustee to serve a 5 year term. Her portrait hangs in the Depot Museum.

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4	CALYER, John	Herndon land owner ca 1870 after whom Calyer Street was named. He furnished the bell for St. Timothy's Mission. Calyer Street was renamed Haley Place by Haley Smith when he opened it up for use. It is located between Grace Street and the W. and O. D. Railroad Regional Park.
	CASTLEMAN, Miss Ida Lee	(1860-1940). Daughter of Mary M. Castleman. School teacher, The Herndon Seminary, and beloved Sunday School teacher. One of the founders of the Fortnightly Club. She died of "old age" 15 Dec 1940. All four Castleman sisters are buried in a row with identical tomb stones in Chestnut Grove Cemetery near Herndon Parkway's intersection with Dranesville Road.
	CASTLEMAN, Miss Lucy Belle (Lula) (Lulu)	(1862-1926.) Daughter of Mary M. Castleman. School teacher, The Herndon Seminary and beloved Sunday School teacher. One of the founders of the Fortnightly Club. According to one of their former students, all the Castleman sisters were tiny with sharp noses.
	CASTLEMAN, Miss Mary E.	(1854- 1932) Eldest daughter of Mary M. Castleman. Gleaner. Proprietor of The Herndon Seminary after her mother became ill, and died. She died 2 Apr 1932 age 78.
4	CASTLEMAN, Miss Virginia Carter	(1864-1937) Youngest daughter of Mary M. Castleman. She was confirmed at St. Timothy's Mission February 1878. School teacher, author of <u>Pocohantas</u> , poet, music teacher. One of the founders of the Fortnightly Society of Herndon. Studied Library Science at Drexel Institute in order to become the first Librarian of the first lending library in Fairfax County. Wrote words and music to "Hail to the UDC" (United Daughters of the Confederacy). She died at the home of E. Barbour and Mary Aud Hutchison while on a visit.
4	CASTLEMAN, Mrs. Mary Morrison (Lee)	(16 Apr 1830-21 Jan 1891) Daughter of the Rev. William Fitzhugh Lee and Mary Chilton Lee of Leesburg. Widow of the Rev. Robert A Castleman, Sr. when she moved to Herndon 1873 or 1874. Founder of The Herndon Seminary 1875., a private day and boarding school for both girls and boys. Mother of Robert, Jr., Mary, Ida, Lula and Virginia.
	CASTLEMAN, Rev. Robert Allen Jr. (Fannie F.)	(1858-1936). The son of Mrs. Mary Morrison Lee Castleman and the Rev. Robert A. Castleman. He was ordained Deacon in 1886 and priested 1887. Well respected Episcopal minister in Fairfax County. He and his family occupied the rectory 1892/1893 but returned to St. Timothy's to conduct services after that. The Detwiler family referred to him as Allen. He was a fishing companion of her grandfather, dentist Dr. Benjamin Brown Detwiler, according to Roberta Keys of Herndon, and persuaded Dr. Ben to join the Episcopal church. He was active in The Lee Family Society.
	CHURCH, Charles David	He was one of the 2 persons confirmed the same day the Elden Street sanctuary was consecrated.
1	CLARK, Benjamin W.	Clark's Mill was a planing and saw mill operated by B. W. Clark, precise address unknown. In 1868, he agreed to make the desks, seats and chairs for the school house built on Center Street. See Donald M. LeVine's manuscript documenting the history of that building, now 725 Center Street. Herndon Fortnightly Library.
	CLOPTON, Rev. J. J. and Irene	Two daughters were born to the Cloptons while they were
	CROSS, Frederick Willard	The son of Navy Capt. James and Connie Cross. 28 Oct 1948 - 19 Aug 1970. He was killed by "friendly fire" in the Viet Nam War just two weeks shy of one year's volunteer service in the infantry. He had been an acolyte at St. Timothy's. The hanging altar cross in the present sanctuary was given in his memory.

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	CURTICE, Carol	Church member and architect. He designed the building now known as Henry Hall, the parish house of St. Timothy's Church. He was a member of the Poor Prodigals. men's organization.
2	DAME, Rev. William Meade	He was a young deacon newly graduated from Virginia Theological Seminary when assigned to the outlying mission churches of western Fairfax County in 1869.
	DAVIS, Mr. and Mrs. Richard N. (Elizabeth F.)	Mr. Davis, still a member of St. Timothy's is the retired principal of the Dewberry and Davis, a Fairfax County based engineering corporation. He and Grayson Hanes gratuitously surveyed the Van Buren Street acreage with Grayson Hanes at the time of its purchase. Poor Prodigal member ca 1950. His wife, Elizabeth, was a member of The Fellowship Club during the 1950s, served as Treasurer and Vestry lady.
	DAWSON, Mr. and Mrs. William Henry (Jennie Hindle Robey)	Mr. Dawson was a dedicated member of the church, a Vestryman, and well-respected Herndon building contractor. He was charged with many church renovations and the construction of the Parish House in 1948. He died 24 January 1956. "Miss" Jennie (9 September 1883-22 Feb 1963) sang in the choir for many years. She was baptized, confirmed, married and buried at St. Timothy's. The Sword and Bible window was given in her memory.
	DAY, Dr. John T.	1870 Census, Dranesville District, p 19. John Day, 41, physician, was listed with his wife Elizabeth, 39. His real estate holdings were valued at \$9500.00 and his personal property at \$500.00. Southern sympathizer during the Civil War. The History department of Fairfax County has published 2 books, <i>Dunbarton</i> and <i>Mayfield and Ivy chimney, Country Houses of Country Doctors</i> which include much information about his life and times.
	DAY, Elizabeth (Mrs. John)	(Lizzy) Active member of the Gleaner Society. Remarried Thomas Kinney of Sterling after the death of her first husband Dr. John T. Day.
	DETWILER, Dr. Benjamin B.	(1858-1931) Faithful church member, Vestryman and 1900-1931. He was a successful dentist and prominent citizen, whose home on Elden Street across from the church has been recognized by the Historical Society of Herndon. He and his brother Dr. Ed are credited with bringing gas street lights to Herndon, owning the first car and first telephones in town. The unusual concrete structure opposite the Town Council Chambers on Lynn Street was where the gas was manufactured. <i>owning the gas works</i>
	DETWILER, Dr. Daniel Landis	(1897- 1957) Served as treasurer and Vestryman of St. Timothy's for many years. Practiced dentistry with his father, Dr. Ben and lived in the family home on Elden Street. This family of Detwilers often drove to Alexandria to pick up the students at the Virginia Theological Seminary who conducted services at the church. They housed and fed them as well. Monopoly was the game of choice when inclement weather postponed the return trip. Mrs. D. L. Detwiler (Thelma or "Tommy") was as dedicated to
	DETWILER, Dr. Edwin Landis	(1860-1916) Baptized at St. Timothy's 30 Nov 1887. Medical doctor. Outstanding member of St. Timothy's and resident of Herndon until his untimely death 29 February 1916. Fairfax County Coroner. Benefactor of the Fortnightly Library. His home was called "Summit" and still stands on the corner of Third Street at Grant. The brass altar cross was given by the Detwiler family in his memory. A biography of Dr. Ed, is included in <i>Fairfax County Medical Society 1884 - 1934. - Early Years and Early Leaders.</i>

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2	DETWILER, Thelma (Tommy) (Mrs. Daniel L.)	Mrs. Detwiler left impressive records for St. Timothy's. Although her husband, Dr. Daniel Detwiler was the official treasurer, she appears to have given the reports, handled church correspondence, kept the records and done much of the work of a church secretary - as a volunteer. She was also given credit for being one of the founders of the Fellowship Club.
	DOHERTY, Joe	Sunday School teacher and Vestryman during the 1960's.
	DUFFIE, Florence S. (Mrs. John S.)	Recording Secretary, The Gleaners' Society 1895. In July 1911 she was recognized by the Fortnightly Club of Herndon for her "devoted service of 22 years". (<i>The Fortnightly Club and Library Association of Herndon 1889-1989</i>)
	ENNIS, Ralph O.	Vestryman, 1943-1950. Active in The Poor Prodigals men's organization.
	FICHTER, Mr. John T.	Vestryman, Senior Warden. Active church member during the 1960s.
	FIELD, John Pemble	Vestryman. He and his wife Elizabeth were active church members during the 1960s.
	FLOREA, Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Howard	Faithful members of the church. She sang in the choir. The Crown of Thorns window was given in memory of their only child, Geraldine, who died at a young age. They left their entire estate to St. Timothy's which was applied to the mortgage of the Henry Hall sanctuary.
	FULLER, MR. and Mrs. John (Mae)	John has been a layreader for over 30 years and served on the Vestry. Both have served on many committees. He is professional reader of technical books on tape.
	GALT, Annie A.	One of the "Galt girls" cited by "Aunt Virgie" as a founder of the Fellowship Club. She married James H. Woodring at St. Timothy's 28 April 1927.
	GALT, Emily Horner	One of the "Galt girls" cited by "Aunt Virgie" as a founder of the Fellowship Club. She married George Albaugh Bready at St. Timothy's 27 December 1924.
	GALT, Rev. Alexander and Mrs.	Mr. Galt moved his family to Herndon from Bowling Green, KY and began his ministry to St. Timothy's 1 October 1921 and retired to Falls Church 1 October 1931. His 3 daughters were married at St. Timothy's.
	GALT, Virginia P.	One of the "Galt girls" cited by "Aunt Virgie" Wynkoop as a founder of the Fellowship Club. She married Elmer Wood at St. Timothy's 20 June 1929.
	GARRETT, Benjamin	He billed the Town Council \$4.50 for its use of Garrett's Hall after meetings were held there 1880/1881. (<i>Herndon Council minutes 28 February 1881.</i>) The Gleaners rented the upstairs hall for their "Entertainments" in the 1890's. Downstairs housed a school. Shown on the NE corner of Elden Street near Centre on the Hopkins map of 1878. Schneider <i>Memories</i> p 13
	GARRETT, Enos L.	Clerk of the Town of Herndon as of 10 July 1880. Owner of Garrett's Hall. Secretary of the Methodist Episcopal Church Sunday School 1873. Postmaster 1867.
	GENEBACH, Lowell	He has served St. Timothy's as Lay-reader, Sunday School superintendent and teacher, Head of the Acolytes, Vestryman and is the present Parish Administrator. Most knowledgeable about St. Timothy's and the Episcopal Church.
	GILLETTE, E. Russell (Doc)	Well-respected Herndon citizen. He is credited with saving the bronze cross which graced the roof of the bell tower. Trustee for the Masonic Lodge.

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<p>GOCHENOUR, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne (Helen)</p>	<p>Vestryman and, with his wife Helen, Sunday School teacher during the 1960s. He generously gave of his time and talent in regards to the furnace and structure of the church.</p>
<p>HANES, Helen C. (Mrs. Stanley B.)</p>	<p>Helen was the church organist for many years. An active member of the Fellowship Club, 1940s-1950s. Now in her 96th year, she continues to worship at St. Timothy's on a regular basis.</p>
<p>HANES, Mr. and Mrs. Grayson Bland (Elizabeth)</p>	<p>Grayson, the brother of Stanley, served the church in many capacities including Vestryman for many years. He was a faithful member and great asset to the choir almost all his life. Active member of the Poor Prodigals. A marine architect by profession.</p>
<p>HANES, Stanley Bartlett</p>	<p>Faithful communicant, Trustee, Church warden and Vestryman until his death 20 May 1973. An attorney, he also served as legal advisor. The bell stand in front of Henry Hall was given in his memory.</p>
<p>HANES, William</p>	<p>Baptized, Confirmed and married at St. Timothy's. Vestryman, 1969. Attorney in Leesburg.. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley B. Hanes.</p>
<p>HANNA, Catherine M. (Mrs. Nathaniel) (Kitty Kitchen)</p>	<p>Kitty Kitchen. "The Oldest Inhabitant" interviewed in 1905/1906 by Miss Virginia Castleman in the book of that title. She was baptized by Rev. McGill as an adult October 16, 1875, sponsored by David Sanford Johnson. She was confirmed 23 February 1878. Gleaner member.</p>
<p>HARDING, Barbara (Mrs. Rueben)</p>	<p>Member of St. Timothy's since 1949. Choir Director, organist during the 1960s. Serves on the Finance Committee. Founder of Harding Hall established in 19--. Taught kindergarten classes at Herndon Elementary from 197- until 198--. For over 30 years, she has organized a chorus of very young children who sing in the Town Square. Internationally known as an authority on folk dancing, she organizes an annual student exchange with Denmark.</p>
<p>HAWTHORNE, Jane Hutchison (Mrs. Glenn)</p>	<p>Lifelong member of St. Timothy's since she was baptized as a baby 6 July 1916. She has been on the church rolls longer than any other present member. She was active in the Fellowship club and other church organizations. Crafted the pair of needlepoint kneelers used at weddings. She attended the Herndon Seminary through the 4th grade and remembers the Castleman family well. Jane's mother, Mary (Aud) Hutchison was also a lifetime member of St. Timothy's.</p>
<p>HAWTHORNE, R. Glenn</p>	<p>Faithful communicant, Vestryman, Warden, Treasurer and choir member. He was a Division Chief, Bureau of Public Works, U. S. Treasury before he retired.</p>
<p>1 HENRY'S BLACKSMITH SHOP</p>	<p>See SIMMS.</p>
<p>HENRY, The Rev. John C.</p>	<p>Rector of St. Timothy's from 1958 to 1974 when he retired to Mathews, Virginia. He died December 20, 1986. A 1930 graduate of Virginia Military Institute, Mr. Henry entered the ministry after a career in government service which included the White House during the administration of Franklin Roosevelt. He and his wife Rhea and son John lived in the last rectory owned by St. Timothy's on Vine Street. Active in community affairs, he served as president of the Rotary Club and accompanied the Herndon Volunteer Fire Department on calls whenever he could.</p>
<p>HERIOT, Theodore S.</p>	<p>The son of Theodore and Florence Heriot, He was killed in the Viet Nam War 13 June 1969 at age 18. The altar chairs (sidilia) used in the Henry Hall sanctuary were given the church in his memory.</p>

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1	HINDLE, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence D.(Anne)	He was one of the first six councilmen of Herndon. He served as President of the Council 1880/1881 He was born in Lancaster, England 1809 and died 1886. The 1870 census lists his occupation as farmer, age 61. He served as trustee for the Herndon School Association 1871/72. A dedicated and active member of St. Timothy's from the beginning.
	HOWARD, Lida	One of the 2 persons confirmed the same day the Elden Street sanctuary was consecrated.
	HUBERT, Mr. and Mrs. Frederic (Thelma)	Member of St. Timothy's for over 30 years. Vestryman. After retirement from his profession as a plant pathologist at Dulles Airport he became Executive Vice President of the Greater Herndon Reston Chamber of Commerce.
	HUMME, Frank	Dedicated member of St. Timothy's until his death. Senior Warden, Sunday School Superintendent and teacher. Owned and operated Humme and Robertson, a farm implement business in Herndon.
18	HUMME, Sue	A founder of The Fellowship Club and active member of St. Timothy's for many years.
	HUTCHISON, Christine (Mrs. Joseph O.)	Dedicated member of St. Timothy's for over 50 years. Active in the Fellowship Club and other church organizations. Former choir member. Sunday School teacher. Currently serves on the Memorials Committee.
	HUTCHISON, E. Barbour	Sunday School Superintendent. Principle of Herndon High School ----- The Hutchison Elementary School on Parcher Drive was named in his honor. He and his wife Mary Aud were married at St. Timothy's.
	HUTCHISON, Joseph O.	Conscientious and faithful member of St. Timothy's since 1944. Has served as Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Vestryman and Delegate to Council. He has been a Trustee for over 25 years.
	HUTCHISON, JR. E. Barbour	Lifelong member of the church. Born and raised in Herndon. He was killed during the Battle of Omaha Beach during World War II
3	JOHNSON , the Rev. Joseph Rawson	The minutes of the committee to establish a public school in Herndon note that Rev. J. R. Johnson was elected chairman 14 July 1868. The United States Census 1870, Microfilm reel M593-1645 Fairfax County, p 11 dwelling 76 family 77: Rev. Joseph R. Johnson, preacher, is listed as being age 63 and his wife, Sophia, age 63. They valued their real estate at \$800.00 and their personal property at \$100.00.
* 1	JOHNSON, David Sanford S.	The son of Joseph and Sophia Johnson. Resident of Herndon. United States Census 1870, shows him to be age 32 and a music teacher living in the home of his parents. Headmaster of a School for Boys located in the Mission Building. First Lay reader, first Sunday School teacher. Chronicler of the St. Timothy's early history. He married and was "removed to California" in 1876 where his wife died in 1881. His wife's name is not given, in the church records.
3	JOHNSON, Frances E.	Miss Johnson was the first bride to be married in the church. The Rev. John McGill. performed the ceremony on 23 Dec 1872 Judge Emerson A. Merriman was the groom. She was 25 and he was 30.
3	JOHNSON, Sophia	Wife of the Rev. Joseph R. and mother of David S. S. Johnson. She was a member of the first congregation that in 1868 that became St. Timothy's and was one of the 3 first Sunday School teachers. She died in DC at age 84 of "general disability" and is buried in Chestnut Grove.

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10	KEYS, Roberta A. (Bobby)	Baptized, and confirmed at St. Timothy's, also married there. in 1942, the first wedding performed by the Rev. Arthur Lyon Lyon-Vaiden. As the granddaughter of Dr. Ben and Roberta Lee Detwiler and daughter of Beulah Detwiler Anderson, she continues 3 lifetimes of membership at St. Timothy's. Bobby and her late husband purchased the Detwiler family home on Elden Street in 1946 where they lived for many years. She moved from the area in 2002. <i>deceased as of 2004</i>
10	KIDWELL, Mr. and Mrs. Calvin (Mildred)	He was a member of the church until his death 30 Jan 1971. Mayor of Herndon 1947-1949 and 1953- 1954. Mildred sang in Choir, taught Sunday School, and was an active member of the Fellowship Club.
4	KILLAM, Stephen	He was Herndon's Post and Station Master. On January 14, 1879 was chosen the first president of the first Board of Councilmen when the town was incorporated. He was President of the Cemetery Association when it was formed in 1881. Remembered for his efforts to beautify the town with plantings of trees. He died March 4, 1898 and was buried in Chestnut Grove..
	KILLAM, Susan	On June 30, 1872 she became the first person confirmed at the Mission. She married Howard Blanchard. She and her husband both taught school in what is now called "The Yellow House" beside the Hike and Bike Trail in back of Green's Funeral Home.
	KILLION, Mr. and Mrs. Howard (Helen)	Vestryman 19-- - 19--. Active in the Poor Prodigals. Helen was Altar Guild Directress during the 1960's.
	LAONHARDT, Jacob	Vestryman, 1878. Proprietor of J. P. Laonhardt & Co.(a lumber business). Shown on the Hopkins map. In 1870 census he valued the family's real estate at \$10,000. and personal property at \$2,000.00. Occupation - lumber dealer. Born 1829 in Germany, naturalized citizen. Occupation shown on 1900 census - engineer.
4	LAONHARDT, Mary	Information provided by Misses Elizabeth and Emma Ellmore: Pronounced "lenhart". The family lived "up Lynn St." Mary gave a flag and Bible to each school in Fairfax County. Schneider <i>Memories</i> : The Laonhardts gave the first Bible and the pulpit to the Methodist Episcopal Church, the first church built in Herndon, 1872. She was also a teacher in the Sunday School there 1873. Born 1831. The Laonhardts were the parents of 6 children.
	LAWRENCE, Mr. and Mrs. Cassius M. (Addie)	Senior Warden of St. Timothy's for many years. Side windows in their memory were given by Mrs. Weschler, he by the Font window and she by the cross and crown window.
	LAWRENCE, Theresa	Credited with being a founder of the Fellowship club.
5	MANKIN, Benjamin A. and Mrs. (Fannie DeLemoine)	Born 1849. Vestryman, Registrar and Trustee of St. Timothy's. Mrs. Schneider recalled him as "a brisk little man always neatly dressed". He was the proprietor of a general store near the depot. Town Councilman. Fannie was one of the more dedicated "Gleaners". Mr. Mankin was baptized in the Herndon Methodist Church and confirmed at St. Timothy's. 6 Dec 1879. The Mankins were buried in the Methodist Cemetery in DC.
1	MCGILL, DD., the Rev. John	(15 August 1840 - 27 December 1925) The second rector to be assigned to St. Timothy's, the first to serve the church on a regular basis, 1872 - 1878. Under his guidance, plans were made to build the Elden Street church. He became the rector of The Falls Church and was the esteemed priest after whom McGill Parish was named. He was a chaplain under Gen. Jubal Early during the Civil War. (From the <i>McGill Family Genealogy</i> in the possession of Jane Perry, a descendent and Senior Warden of St. Timothy's 1995/1996.)

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	MCNABB, Rev. John	<p>¶ Rector of St. Timothy's Born in Ireland in 1843. Immigrated 1866. Naturalized. Husband of Kate. 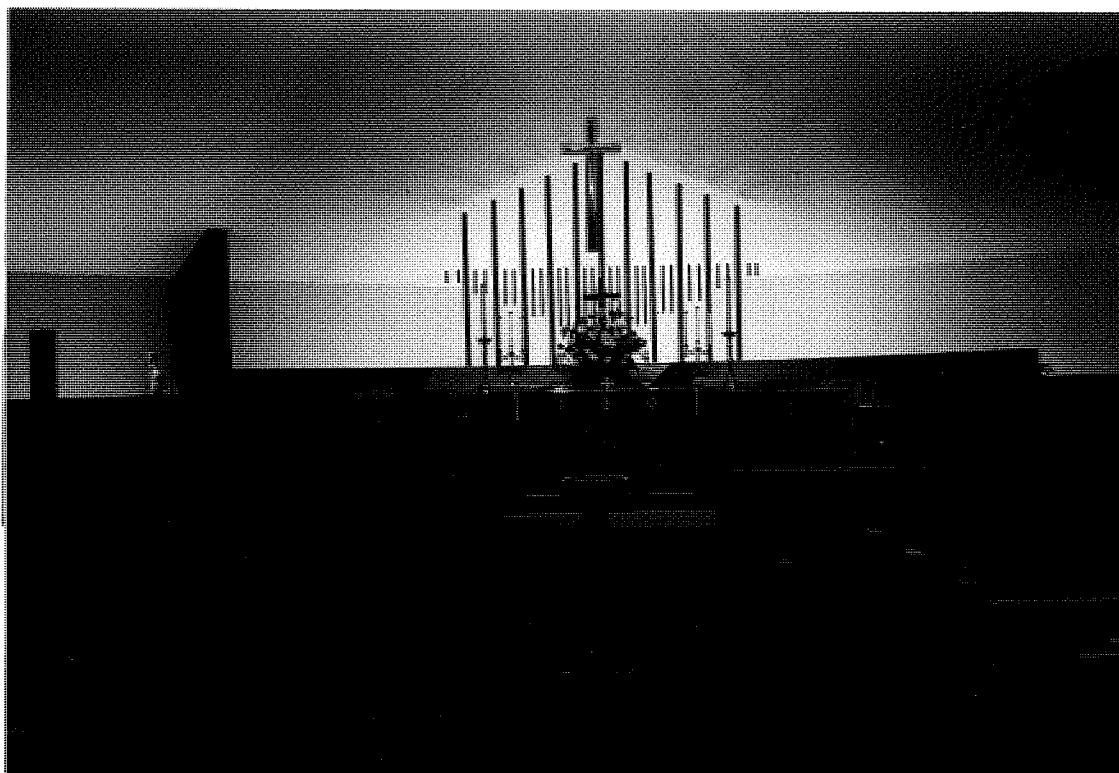

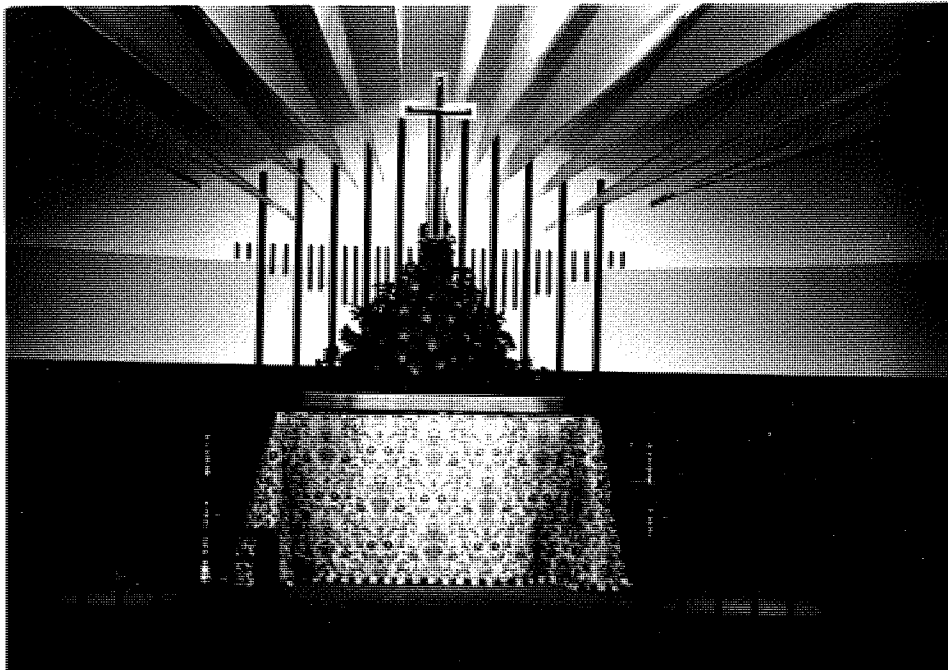

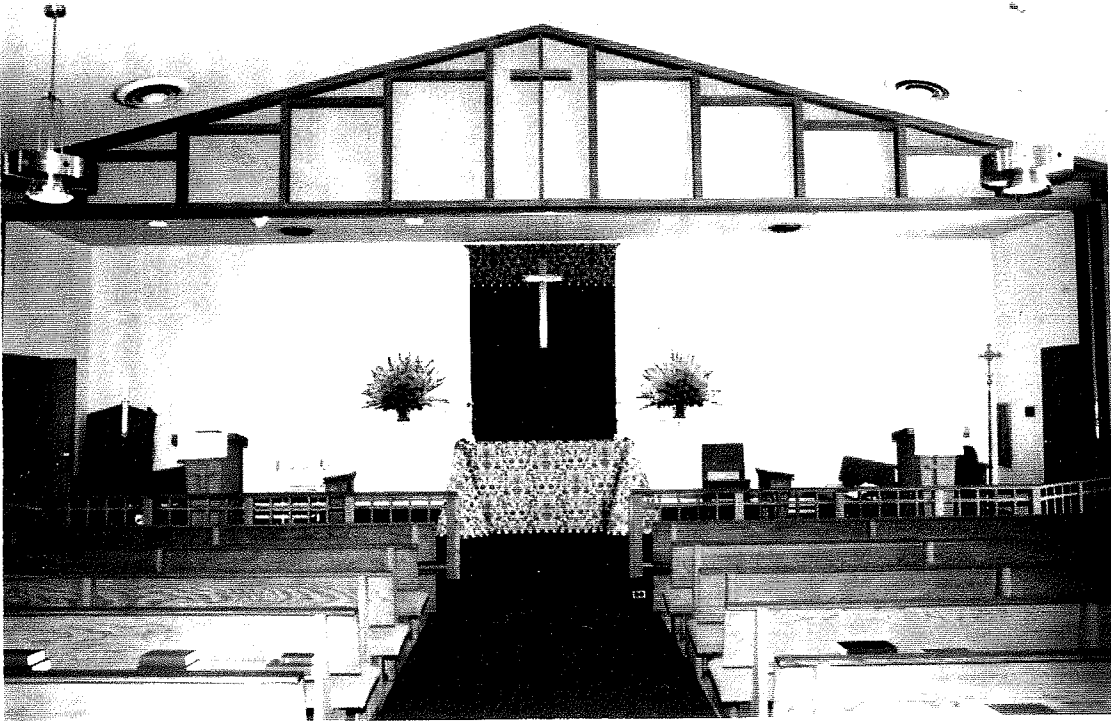

Mary Morrison (Lee) Castleman, 1837 - 1891

The life of a genteel daughter of Virginia

Talk by

Anne Ward Crocker for the Historical Society of Herndon, 23 January 2002

For the past 43 years, every time I go to church, I see the simple white marble baptismal font engraved Mary M. Castleman and "Dead Yet Speaketh" (Hebrews xi 4). She finally spoke to me in 1997 when I was researching the history of the first St. Timothy's church for the Masonic Lodge of Herndon. All that was publicly known about Mrs. Castleman then was that 1) she was a cousin of General Robert E. Lee, 2) she came here a widow with 4 daughters and a son, 3) had founded a school here, the Herndon Seminary, 4) that she was an active member of St. Timothy's and that 5.) her husband had been an Episcopal priest who had died as a result of the Civil War.

Just who was this gutsy lady, who the censuses told me, had children born in 3 states?

Mildly interested in finding out in which battle Reverend Castleman had died, I accessed the extant Confederate records at the Library of Virginia in Richmond and **COULDN'T FIND HIM!** His death had no direct bearing on the Mason's quest, but it certainly aroused my curiosity. Why did this genteel lady settle in the tiny, muddy, railroad village of Herndon? Why was she not buried in Chestnut Grove with her four daughters?

I did find published details of Reverend Castleman's death in 1997, but it wasn't until 2000 that I was able to fully understand the circumstances that led his widow to come here. Encouraged by the Reverend Ruth Ann Garcia, then associate rector of St. Timothy's, I entered the national "Our Woman of History" contest sponsored by the Episcopal Women's History Project. With the help of the internet, I was able to find Mrs. Castleman's great granddaughter, Betty Tabbutt of Olympia, Washington who provided me with pictures and information that the family had saved. I set out to round out her life. And what a life it was!

Mary Morrison Lee was born April 16, 1830 in Richmond, Virginia, the eldest of three children born to the distinguished Episcopal minister, the Reverend William Fitzhugh Lee and Mary Catharine Simms Chilton of Leesburg, Virginia. Forced by poor health at age 33 to give up the active ministry, Mr. Lee moved his family from Richmond to Alexandria during the winter of 1837. He died May 19, 1837, 10 days after his mother and a few months after his youngest child.ⁱ Mary was a child of 7 years at the time. In other words, Mary wept at the funerals of her grandmother, her two-year-old brother or sister, the Lee genealogy only shows the sibling as a child, and her father within months.

Mrs. Lee stayed in Alexandria where apparently Mary and her brother, William Fitzhugh Lee received at least some of their early education. William went on to become the Valedictorian of his class at the Virginia Military Institute and was later appointed second lieutenant in the 2nd U.S. Infantry in 1857. We do not know where Mary studied but it is evident that she also received a strong foundation in the classics and the Bible with strong ties to the Episcopal Church.

The extended Lee Family of Alexandria, grandfather Edmund Jennings Lee, at least one uncle, Cassius Lee, and their families, enjoyed close associations with historic Christ Church, Episcopal High School and the Virginia Theological Seminary. It was most certainly through these connections that Mary met her husband, Robert Allen Castleman, born May 2, 1827 at "Wickliffe" in Clarke County, Virginia, the son of a prosperous farming family.ⁱⁱ Mr. Castleman was educated at Episcopal High School, The University of Virginia and the Virginia Theological Seminary.ⁱⁱⁱ He and Mary were married July 19, 1852 three days after he was ordained a Deacon.

The Castlemans were sent out into the missionary field to serve the area that encompasses Clarksburg, Weston and Fairmont, then in Virginia, now in West Virginia. They remained there after he was ordained priest in November 1853. Insight into that early ministry has survived in the form of a sermon delivered by

his son Robert, also an Episcopal minister on October 11, 1915 and published. In 1857, Mary wrote, presumably, to her mother, that she wished to take the drive with her husband to a service at one of his outlying stations. He thought the 42 miles would be too much for her; so he went alone on horseback to the service, a round trip of eighty-four miles.^{iv} Bishop George W. Peterkin called him "the founder of the Church in Marion County." ^v Two daughters were born in Clarksburg, Mary Eloise on August 10, 1854 and Gertrude Lee on August 24, 1856.

The family of was transferred moved to Harrisburg, Pennsylvania during the summer of 1857 to serve St. Steven's. Mary was again pregnant. A son, Robert Allen, Jr. was born there in November.^{vi} The following January two-year-old Gertrude was killed in an accident involving scalding liquid. She was buried in Harrisburg. The family made many friends in Harrisburg and enjoyed a successful ministry in Pennsylvania. Reverend Castleman is given credit for founding St. Paul's Chapel, consecrated January 8, 1859. In just 7 years Mary had born 3 children, buried one and observed her husband start and build 2 churches. She also taught to help make ends meet.

The political climate in the United States in 1859/1860 gave the Castlemans concern. Their decision to leave Pennsylvania was revealed years later when letters surfaced that had been written by Mr. Castleman at the time. In the sermon, mentioned earlier which was delivered at St. Stevens Robert explained:

"His mother (in Clark County) has just died in Virginia and left him six slaves. He cannot conscientiously set them free; for he cannot tell what would become of them. He cannot send them to Liberia; he has not the means. He cannot bring them here (Harrisburg, PA) in the existing state of feeling on the subject.' His conclusion is, 'he must go back to Virginia, take a country parish and take care of these slaves'.

And so, at the age of thirty-three, he gives up St. Steven's with every prospect of success, usefulness, comfort and advancement, and takes a remote country church in Virginia. (Ultimately he gave his life for a colored man.)"^{vii}

The fate of the slaves is unknown.^{viii}

To Mary, pregnant yet again, the move must have seemed a banishment after two happy and productive ministries. The family arrived at their new home, Lawrenceville, Brunswick County, Virginia near the North Carolina line on March 1, 1860 where Mr. Castleman took charge as Rector of St. Andrew's Parish.^{ix} Three months later, on June 12, Ida Lee, daughter number 3 was born.

The following year, on July 29, 1861, her brother, by now, Lt. Col. William Fitzhugh Lee of the 33rd Virginia Volunteers, C.S.A., died of wounds inflicted at the Battle of Bull Run. (First Manassas)^x He had been arrested in early 1861 by his superior officer in the United States Army for expressing strong disapproval of the action of the government against the South and had been court-martialed. After his release 30th April 1861, he resigned, switched sides, and was appointed a captain in the Virginia Forces. His death must have been devastating to Mary, and another tragic loss for the young family.

The Civil War years, the most difficult of her life, were upon the Castlemans like a shroud. In less than a year, daughter number 4, Lucy Belle was born July 8, 1862. Sometime in 1863, the family was transferred (or loaned - Reverend Castleman was considered a canonical resident of the Diocese of Virginia) to nearby Gaston, North Carolina where he was called to serve the church in Halifax and the mission in Gaston.^{xi}

Practically destitute, they had, at least, been loaned a small farm on which they could grow provisions to feed the family now numbering 7, if, as is believed, Mary's mother also lived in the household. Letters written by Mary tell of the family's desperate struggle, eased only slightly by the pittance she was able to earn teaching a few neighboring children. In one letter, in a year of drought, the horse had died for lack of food. In another she wrote that they didn't need shoes as her husband had some leather and made them himself.^{xii} From the horse? The farm must have been near Halifax but the Castlemans soon moved to a "house at a railroad stop called Summit near the town of Gaston."^{xiii}

Their sixth and last child, Virginia Carter was born in Gaston on August 26, 1864.

In North Carolina Mr. Castleman ministered to small congregations in Weldon, Gaston and Halifax.^{xv} When the war ended in the spring of 1865, conditions went from bad to worse. By the summer both parents sought teaching positions. Mary wrote to a friend in August (copy of letter attached):

"I longed and prayed for peace & it has come, but what a peace! Far better for us had the war lasted twenty years, than to have such an ignominious peace - I pray God to make me more humble & submissive to his will, for I know 'he doeth all things well'".^{xv}

Mr. Castleman was still searching for a teaching position in the fall, continuing his work in Weldon. In September 1865, however, the railroad company withdrew the pass on which he traveled between the two villages. Mr. Lewis writes, "The Civil War had ended, and the minister had no money with which to pay the fare, so he resigned the care of Weldon. The congregation there, realizing that the \$800.00 in Confederate money would be of little help toward building a church, gave it all to Mr. Castleman. With this money the poor man was able to purchase one barrel of flour."

Then on October 11, 1865 while walking home at dusk from a neighbor's home, he was shot at close range and killed.^{xvi}

Mr. Lewis goes on to quote notes written by his aunt about the fateful night:

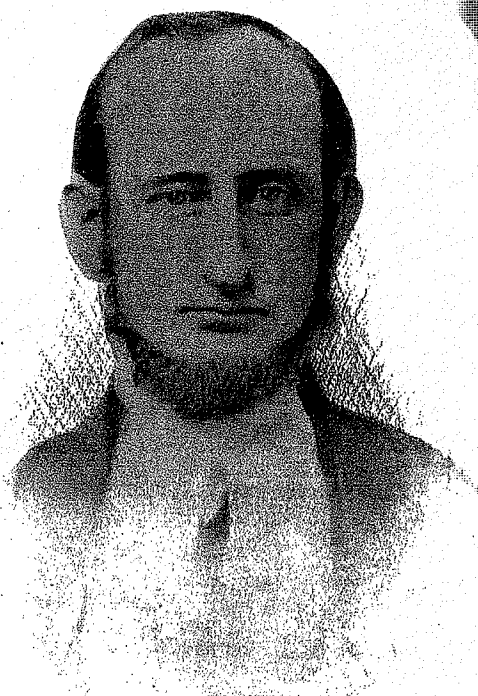

"A former resident in the community wrote of the incident many years later: 'I know that Grandmother (Mrs. Thomas Goode Tucker of Mt. Rekcute, a large plantation nearby) got the news as breakfast was brought in, and she had it put in her carriage and went right down to Mrs. Castleman and brought her and the children (five or more in family) to Mt. Rekcute where they stayed until they went back to Virginia.'^{xviii}

DIED.

CASTLEMAN.—At her home, in Herndon, Fairfax county, Va., January 21, 1891, Mrs. MARY M. CASTLEMAN, widow of the Rev. Robert A. Castleman, aged 61 years.

I heard the voice of Jesus say,
 "Come unto me and rest;
 Lay down, thou weary one, lay down,
 Thy head upon my breast."

I came to Jesus as I was,
 Weary and worn and sad;
 I found in him a resting place,
 And he has made me glad.

[In connection with this notice, the editor remarks for how many years he has known this beloved woman. She was the daughter of the Rev. William F. Lee, the founder of the *Southern Churchman*, was the wife of Rev. R. A. Castleman, who died in North Carolina just after the war, and the mother of Rev. R. A. Castleman, of Westmoreland county.—She leaves this son and several daughters to rise up and bless the memory of their beloved mother.

The funeral was from St. Paul's church, Alexandria, Friday morning.]

Died.--On the 11 of October, 1865, near Gaston, N.C., the Reverend ROBT. A. CASTLEMAN, in the 39th year of his age.

The sad duty falls to our lot of chronicling a most mysterious Providence. Our Reverend brother has fallen, "in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye," by the hand of violence. While returning home from a neighbor's house he was shot down by some person unknown, and thus cruelly murdered. Death must have instantaneously followed the discharge of the gun, the nature of the wound being such as to forbid the idea of lingering suffering, while the position of the body when found, indicated no struggle. It is at least a source of comfort to think that the transition of the soul from the Church Militant to the Church in Paradise, was accomplished without a pang. Who did this unhallowed and sacrilegious deed, or what motive could have prompted it, are facts yet unsolved in mystery. As he had no enemy, capable of such a deed, it is supposed he was the victim of an appalling mistake; and that a blow intended for another, fell upon him. This is the more probable, as it was dim twilight when he rendered up his soul. Mr. Castleman received his theological education at the Seminary in Alexandria, from which he was graduated in 1852, being ordained to Deacon's Orders, July 16th of that year, and to Priest's Orders, the year following. He was Rector of the Parish in Clarksburg, Harrison County, Va, [now West Virginia] for five years, having succeeded in building a neat church edifice at that place. From thence he removed to Harrisburg, Pa., but returned to his native Diocese in 1859 assuming charge of St. Andrew's Parish, Brunswick County, Va. He afterwards was invited to Halifax, North Carolina, of which Parish he was Rector at the time of his death. Our beloved brother leaves behind him, a widow and five children--may God comfort them! His many and warm friends will "keep his memory green." It is a source of comfort to them, to recall his earnestness in preaching "Jesus Christ and Him crucified," and to remember how honestly he endeavored to "set Him forth" not by "preaching" only, but by "living" also. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord; even so saith the Spirit for they do rest from their labors,"

From the Southern Churchman 11 November 1865 p.3 c.2:

Virginia.-We have a few additional particulars of the murder of the Reverend Mr. Castleman, formerly a clergyman of this Diocese, but within the

last year or two, resident in North Carolina, near Gaston. On the night of his death he had gone out to spend an evening with a neighbor--Mr. William E. Brodnax. On his return, he was met or waylaid by a party or parties, not yet identified, who shot, and from the nature of his wound, almost immediately killed him. He was found on Thursday morning, on the road between Mr. Brodnax's residence and his own, with a fearful gunshot wound in his side, and a dark discolorization of the parts about the wound, as though he had been scarred by burning powder. The fatal weapon had, no doubt, been placed in close contact with the body.

To spend time in vain regrets, is folly. --The Diocese knew Mr. Castleman. He has left a wife and five little children without a cent, and they have no relations who can help them. Will not this Diocese, poor as we are, do something for the widow and orphans of one of her murdered clergymen? We will gladly undertake the work of receiving funds for this purpose. Who will be the first to send us money for so deserving and important an object? We earnestly hope we shall not appeal in vain.

A Listing in Appleton's Cyclopdedia^{xix}, an annual publication of important events and people shows:

Castleman, Robert, an Episcopal clergyman of Petersburg, VA was murdered near Gaston, N.C. for this efforts in behalf of the freedmen, Oct 11, 1865.

Robert Allen Castleman may have died "on behalf of his efforts for the freedmen"^{xx} or because of a case of mistaken identity.^{xxi} Mary, a widow at the age of 35 with 5 children, brought his body back to Alexandria where he was buried. His tombstone inscription from Christ Church Cemetery in Alexandria^{xxii} is engraved: *Reverend Robert A. Castleman / born / May 2, 1827 / died / Oct. 11, 1865. / An Affectionate / husband, a devoted / father, a faithful / pastor and preacher / of Christ and Him / crucified.*

Post civil War Herndon

I'm going to digress for a few minutes here to tell you about St. Timothy's Home School for Boys, David S. L. Johnson, Head master. David wrote in a letter to the mother of a prospective student, " No pupil can ever come to me who has suffered more than his schoolmaster from the same sad sad cause. In fact, humanly seeing, S. Timothy's School & master are the results of the war."^{xxiii}

David's parents, Reverend Joseph R. and Sophia Johnson owned the properties on the west side of Grace Street on both sides of Vine.^{xxiv} I don't know the details of their settlement here, but David became well known to us at St. Timothy's because he conducted and documented the first Episcopal service held All Hallow's Eve, 1868.^{xxv} We know from Kitty Kitchen that "Mr. Davy" taught school in the St. Timothy's Mission Building^{xxvi}, the converted cheese factory that became the church's first sanctuary. Kitty didn't name the school, but through a serendipitous phone call to the church from Professor Antonio de la Cova of the Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology in Terre Haute, Indiana in 1998, we were able to name the school and gain much information about Herndon in 1873/4. To make a long story short, through the eyes of a 15-year old boy, a student at St. Timothy's Home School for Boys, we learned that Herndon had 50 houses, up from 2 -3 in 1867, 3 or 4 stores, a blacksmith shop, carpenters shop, saw and grain mill, 2 churches and the mission.^{xxvii} The Gonzales/Johnson letters give a most colorful account of life in Herndon in 1873. Some of the language is offensive to African-Americans by today's standards and must be read in historical context. The Historical Society of Herndon has a set.

To return to Mrs. Castleman:

Back among friends and family in Alexandria, according to City Directories and the 1870 census, Mary and her mother taught school there for next few years.^{xxviii} Although she may have known him before, it was almost certainly during this time that she was befriended by the Reverend John McGill, Minister-in-Charge of the outlying mission churches within Truro Parish including tiny congregations in Chantilly, Fairfax Court House, Centreville and Herndon. According to Kitty Kitchen, Reverend McGill visited Herndon Sunday afternoons twice a month "in his little carriage drawn by the mos' patient old horse...everybody come to hear him, not that he was such a great preacher, but there went before and followed after him the lovin' grace o' God...seems like he was sent as the messenger of peace to this distracted country, laid waste as it was.... he was a real Southern gentleman, good manners an' all, an' he ever had a kind word for all: there was nothin' small 'bout him cep'n his size...."^{xxix}

Mary credits Mr. McGill with influencing her to settle to Herndon, a small, prosperous village in western Fairfax County, one hour by train from

Alexandria.^{xxx} The fledgling Episcopal congregation there worshipped, in the words of Kitty Kitchen, again, "in a former cheese factory ... which they had fixed up [into] the nices' prayer-place".^{xxxi} The upper part of the mission building that had housed St. Timothy's Home School for Boys,^{xxxii} became available when the headmaster moved. The opportunity to found a proper school for young ladies was at hand. Mary, her mother, Mrs. Lee, Mary, 20, Ida, 14, Lucy "Lula", 12, and Virginia, 10 again resettled most likely in 1874. Robert, Jr. age 17, was a boarding student at Episcopal High School in Alexandria.

The years of 1875 and beyond were most productive for both Mary and St. Timothy's. Mrs. Castleman organized the ladies into a society they called The Gleaners "to promote the interests of the church"^{xxxiii}. Meeting weekly, year in and year out for over 20 years, the women sewed sunbonnets, aprons, children's clothes and quilts that they sold for pennies. The Gleaners paid much of the construction and maintenance expenses not only the church but for a rectory as well, but in their words: "It was largely owing to her efforts that St. Timothy's church and rectory were built..."^{xxxiv}

The Herndon Seminary, founded by Mrs. Castleman in 1875, moved from the Mission to her home in 1881, the year St. Timothy's Church was consecrated, the Mission building sold and she purchased the property on Grace Street. With the help of her eldest daughter Mary and later, the sisters, a full curriculum was taught including Bible study, church history, music, Miss Virginia's forte, and art, Miss Ida's talent. Boarding students were expected to attend services at St. Timothy's where the sisters also taught Sunday School.

In 1889, The Herndon Seminary was the site of the first meeting of the Study Club, forerunner of the Fortnightly Club, still functioning today. They met every two weeks "for the mutual improvement of its members in literature, art, science, and the vital interests of the day." Guided by Miss Virginia, Mary's youngest daughter, the women went on to found the first lending library in Fairfax County.

Mary Morrison (Lee) Castleman died at the Seminary January 21, 1891. In a final tribute to their friend, the Gleaners Society recorded:

"With her to conceive a plan was synonymous with its execution wherever careful forethought, strong personality and devoted self-sacrifice made it possible. Conscientious systematic and liberal

consecration of her means to her Master's service was one of her most marked characteristics."^{xxxv}

In her death notice in *The Southern Churchman*, January 29, 1891, the editor noted "[In connection with this notice, the editor remarks for how many years he has known this beloved woman.... The funeral was from St. Paul's church, Alexandria....]"

She was buried beside her husband in Christ Church Episcopal Cemetery in Alexandria. On her tombstone: *He that believeth in Me, though he / were dead, yet / shall he live.*^{xxxvi}

Resolved, That "The Gleaners" desire to express their deep sense of the loss that the community, and their organization in particular, have sustained in the death of Mrs. Castleman, a true friend and co-worker.

Resolved, That this society reviews with full appreciation the untiring and faithful work done by Mrs. Castleman, as it was largely owing to her efforts that St. Timothy's Church and rectory were built and that "The Gleaners" of which she was a most active member and officer, has been firmly established.

Resolved, That this body owes much of its growth and prosperity to her, who was one of its best friends and whose death is the first among its members since its organization some sixteen years ago.

Although possessing a delicate frame, yet she exhibited great strength of character, and marvellous energy.

With her to conceive a plan was synonymous with its execution wherever careful forethought, strong personality and devoted self-sacrifice made it possible. Conscientious systematic and liberal consecration of her means to her Master's service was one of her most marked characteristics. Throughout her prolonged illness she showed the liveliest interest in all that concerned the well-being of her church and its organizations, and has left an example worthy of close imitation.

Resolved, That these resolutions be recorded in the minutes of this society, be published in The Southern Churchman and that a copy be sent to the family as an expression of sincere respect and sympathy.
